Since opening to the public in 2005, Governors Island has played a vital and growing role as a vibrant and accessible resource for all New Yorkers. - Welcomed more visitors than ever to enjoy the Island year-round
- Increased public access hours in the evening and dramatically expanded ferry service, with direct daily connections to the Lower East Side and South Brooklyn waterfront via NYC Ferry
- Launched Governors Island Arts as the arts and cultural program of the Trust and debuted two colossal public art commissions
- Took critical steps forward in establishing a Center for Climate Solutions on Governors Island

Looking forward, we will continue to advance our bold vision to grow the Island as a year-round destination; steward our 120 acres of open space; bring transformative arts and cultural experiences to our visitors; and make strides in establishing a campus for learning, culture, education, and innovation in the areas of climate change and the environment. 

Unique Open Space for Everyone

With 120 acres of open space, Governors Island is known throughout New York City as an affordable and accessible destination—providing a year-round outdoor oasis for nearly one million visitors each year.

For the first time ever, visitors were able to enjoy Governors Island's 40-acre, climate resilient park in every season—including car-free bike paths, urban hiking, playgrounds, hammocks, slides, a new climbing boulder, snow on The Hills, stunning views, and more recreational opportunities.

The Island's 12 acres of athletic fields were used for **more than 300 games, practices, and events** by youth and adult leagues, schools, and nonprofit organizations. **750 groups held barbecues and other gatherings** across the Island's two outdoor grilling areas.

Governors Island invited canine visitors to enjoy the Island's open space for the first time in 2022 with the new **Winter Dog Days** program and dog park, running from November through April.



The Trust debuted two seasonal, wheelchair accessible electric trams this year, which circle the Island on our highest visitation days in the spring, summer, and fall months.











The Trust's talented horticulture team works year-round to care for the Island's 120 acres of open space. Using a wide range of ecological gardening methods, they help to ensure our diverse landscapes can continue to thrive far into the future

Horticultural highlights from 2022 include:

- Planting 60 trees around the Island comprising 18 different native species, further diversifying our canopy.
- Conducting an **Island-wide tree survey** and developing a **Community Forest Management Plan** to better understand and steward the diversity, health, and longevity of our unique urban forest.
- Planting more than 9,000 spring-flowering bulbs to create a beautiful array of blooms for visitors to enjoy in the spring.
- Propagating 3,500 plants to support native biodiversity.
- Using solarization, a zero waste non-herbicidal weed intervention tool, to manage invasive species and preserve native plant communities.
- Welcoming back a flock of sheep from Friends of Tivoli
 Lake Preserve and Farm, which once again provided eco friendly landscape care that reduced the need for harmful
 chemicals. The flock cleared three acres of invasive
 plants, helping ensure our plant population can thrive.
- Identifying and cataloging 216 different species of insects and pollinators, alongside an undergraduate insect ecology course from the City College of New York, to better understand and care for the smallest members of the Island's ecosystem.







A Diverse Mix of Events & Amenities

A record 27 food and beverage vendors helped cement Governors Island as a culinary destination this year.

- New vendors included The Real Mother Shuckers, La Newyorkina, Gitano Island, and Carreau Club—a Brooklyn-based pétanque club.
- The Trust's partnership with NYCHA's Office of Resident Economic
 Empowerment & Sustainability continued this year, with a rotating group of small businesses operated by NYCHA residents offering diverse cuisines from The Foodie Spot, located seasonally in Liggett Terrace.

The Trust, the Friends, and partners and organizers from throughout the city hosted 50 public events on Governors Island this year—90% of which were totally free.

- Pumpkin Point, the annual fall festival presented by the Friends in partnership with the Trust, allowed 28,000 visitors to enjoy two full weekends of New York City's largest free pumpkin patch.
- Governors Island Arts' inaugural House Fest celebrated collaboration among the Organizations in Residence in Nolan Park and Colonels Row with three days of free programs and performances.
- **Jazz by the Water** welcomed jazz musicians to the Island for two free outdoor festivals celebrating the genre's past, present, and future.
- Pride Island, NYC Pride's annual music festival, took place on the Island's Play Lawns this year, bringing thousands of revelers together to celebrate New York City's LGBTQIA+ community.
- Two **free outdoor film screenings**, co-presented with Film at Lincoln Center, saw New Yorkers descend on the Parade Ground for classics under the stars: John Cameron Mitchell's *Hedwig and the Angry Inch* and Sidney Lumet's *The Wiz*.
- **The Longines Global Champions Tour** gathered the world's best equestrians for a weekend of free events and horse jumping competition.
- **The Governors Island Winter Village** offered visitors a new cold weather activity in 2021 and returned for the 2022-23 winter season. Amenities include a 7,500 square-foot ice skating rink, fire pits, lawn games, seasonal food and drink, and bike and sled rentals from Blazing Saddles.







This Year at the Urban Farm

The GrowNYC teaching garden donated produce grown on Governors Island to community-based organizations that support food-insecure New Yorkers, minimizing waste and advocating for equitable food access.









Volunteers play a vital role in caring for Governors Island year-round. 2022 saw more volunteers than ever dedicate their time and resources to the Island across two key areas: visitor services and horticulture.

Friends of Governors Island individual and corporate volunteers contributed 8,400 combined hours of service at the Island's Welcome Centers, leading free public tours, welcoming visitors to Shantell Martin's *The May Room*, and assisting the Trust's horticulture team.


Through an ongoing partnership with youth workforce nonprofit Futures and Options, the Friends of Governors Island hosted a cohort of interns for the summer for the third year. This year, nine interns gained direct work experience serving as Island Ambassadors, greeting visitors, conducting tours, coordinating visitor surveys, and more.

The first annual Earth Day of Service, presented by the Friends in partnership with the Trust. engaged more than 400 New Yorkers in high-impact ecological projects around the Island, culminating in a free community celebration featuring food trucks, games, performances, and crafts.



TRANSFORMATIVE PUBLIC ART & CULTURE

Governors Island is one of New York City's most dynamic cultural destinations. This year, the arts and cultural programs presented by the Trust officially launched as Governors Island Arts, and the program debuted two ambitious commissions—each years in the making.





Charles Gaines's Moving Chains

Singular Public Art Experiences

Governors Island Arts presents a combination of shortand long-term public art projects that are uniquely situated here, existing in dialogue with the Island's history and conditions.

Sam Van Aken's **The Open Orchard** debuted in the spring, with 102 hybrid fruit trees planted in the Island's park. Each tree contains different heirloom fruit varieties grafted together, creating a living agricultural archive of fruits that were once grown in New York City but have disappeared due to climate change and industrialized agriculture.

Charles Gaines's *The American Manifest Chapter Two: Moving Chains* opened to the public on Governors Island in October. Evoking a ship's hull and calling attention to slavery's ongoing legacy in the United States, this 110-foot-long kinetic sculpture features massive chains running its length overhead—eight of which are representative of the pace of the currents in New York Harbor, while the ninth recalls the pace of ship traffic in the harbor over the past 400 years. This multi-year work presented by Governors Island Arts, Creative Time, and Times Square Arts launched in the summer of 2022 with Chapter One, an opera and installation in Times Square. The piece is on display at the base of Outlook Hill through June 2023, when it will move to Cincinnati, Ohio for Chapter Three.

Building Cultural Community in the Historic District

Reflecting the diversity of New York City in one central hub, Governors Island Arts' seasonal Organizations in Residence present accessible programming and events while serving artists and cultural practitioners with free studios and workspaces.

This year, two dozen arts, cultural, educational, and environmental nonprofits utilized space in the historic houses of Nolan Park and Colonels Row to present nearly 200 exhibitions, residencies, and public programs that directly engaged 31,000 Island visitors, including:

- The Museum of Contemporary African Diasporan Art (MoCADA) presented a season of programming centered around abolition and social justice, including Supremacy Project, a group installation that addressed the systemic violence and oppression that BIPOC communities are fighting to end.
- American Indian Community House exhibited works by Indigenous artists, held community events including staged readings and discussions, and presented workshops and events centering Indigenous traditions and culture.
- New Art Dealers Alliance (NADA)'s annual NADA House invited visitors to view works from 50+ international artists working in new contemporary and emerging art.
- ArtCrawl Harlem held their annual residency program on the Island, allowing artists the space to create a variety of theme-based artworks, alongside a photography exhibition, a textile exhibition, and an interactive piece interrogating microaggressions.
- **BronxArtSpace** provided residency space for Bronx-based artists and invited the public to monthly open studios.

INNOVATION IN CLIMATE & THE ENVIRONMENT



Taking Shape: The Center for Climate Solutions

In 2022, the Trust made monumental progress on the development of the Center for Climate Solutions.

Dedicated to preparing New York City and cities around the world for climate change, the Center for Climate Solutions will create a physical hub committed to researching and demonstrating urban climate development and advancing education, training, and workforce in climate and environmental fields. The Center for Climate Solutions on Governors Island was announced as a key part of Mayor Eric Adams' "Rebuild, Renew, Reinvent: A Blueprint for NYC's Economic Recovery" this year. At full scale, the project is anticipated to create 7,000 permanent jobs on Governors Island alone.

As part of a competitive Request for Proposals process, the Trust received three ambitious proposals from leading universities to create a premier institution on Governors Island to anchor the Center, which is envisioned to include multiple tenants and partners dedicated to education, research, and public programs to address the global climate crisis.

Proposals include visions to advance interdisciplinary research focused on urban adaptation, urban environments, public policy, environmental justice, and public health while expanding educational and workforce development opportunities for New Yorkers. A winning proposal will be selected and announced in 2023.

PLANNING, INVESTMENT & A GROWING COMMUNITY OF TENANTS



Updates From Our Year-Round Tenants

Governors Island is home to a growing community of educational, nonprofit, and commercial tenants working in sectors including arts, climate, hospitality, and youth development.

Lower Manhattan Cultural Council's Arts Center at Governors Island granted residencies to nearly 50 artists, hosted monthly free public programs, and displayed three exhibitions: *Sun Seekers*, an immersive sculptural and performance work by Amy Khoshbin and Jennifer Khoshbin; *Back and Song*, a film and art installation by Elissa Blount-Moorhead and Bradford Young; and *Pillars*, a participatory sculpture by Simon Benjamin.

QC NY opened to the public in the spring, providing a range of wellness spa experiences including outdoor heated pools, saunas, steam rooms, water therapies, and more.

The Urban Assembly New York Harbor School is set to double in size. In August 2022, Mayor Eric Adams along with the Trust and the School Construction Authority announced plans to grow the school's footprint from two to four buildings, including one soon-to-be constructed facility, adding additional classroom space, a pool, a competition gymnasium, and specialty lab facilities to this maritime and environmental public high school on Governors Island.

Beam Center utilized their Maker Space on Governors Island to promote project-based STEM and artistic programs with their youth participants. In addition, the annual Beam Camp City welcomed 400+ young New Yorkers for an accessible outdoor summer camp experience on Governors Island.

Billion Oyster Project engaged more than 3,000 students through its partnership with the Harbor School and its K-12 STEM curriculum and introduced its first public shell collection site, where New Yorkers can drop off their used shells—diverting them from landfills to instead aid reef restoration efforts.

Wind Support NYC, which supports wind technology projects with a goal of decarbonizing ocean shipping, joined as a tenant in 2022.











Fostering Diversity in Real Estate in New York City

Now in its second year, the Real Estate
Pathways Fellowship program—a
collaboration between the Trust for
Governors Island and the Brooklyn Navy Yard
Development Corporation—is providing CUNY
students with direct experience across the
real estate industry and related fields.

In 2021, the Trust and Brooklyn Navy Yard joined efforts to make commitments towards inclusivity within the New York City real estate sector. The Real Estate Pathways Fellowship program, a product of these efforts, provides CUNY students in the final year of their degree program with the opportunity to gain hands-on experience in jobs in real estate at both organizations, including real estate development, design and construction, property management, horticulture, and more.

Since its inception, the fellowship has served **20 CUNY** students, with **90% of the Year One graduates getting** full time employment in their field. In 2022, Year Two participants were paired with mentors who are able to provide valuable insight and networking opportunities in each fellow's respective field of interest. The third program cohort will begin recruitment in earnest in early 2023.

A Permanent Cultural Campus in Nolan Park

Nolan Park's bucolic setting and central location in Governors Island's historic district help make it an incredible resource for visitors and tenants alike.

In 2022, Mayor Eric Adams announced investment in Governors Island Arts as part of his economic recovery blueprint. Over the next decade, the City of New York and the Trust are committed to investing in evolving Governors Island Arts' seasonal Organizations in Residence program into **year-round permanent homes for arts, cultural, and educational organizations on Governors Island.**

Two year-round tenants already occupy space in Nolan Park: Shandaken: Projects and the Institute for Public Architecture, each of which held several residency programs for cultural practitioners along with exhibitions and other public events in 2022. This year, **the Trust began restoration work in historic Nolan Park Building 20**, with longtime Island tenant and partner Billion Oyster Project set to relocate its office headquarters into the space in 2023.



In July, the Trust released two Requests for Proposals (RFPs) inviting operators of event, food and beverage, and hospitality venues to adaptively reuse several buildings in the historic district, including four in Nolan Park. Selected respondents will help breath new life into these historic buildings, offering long-term amenities that can advance Nolan Park and Governors Island's year-round community.

As the designated fundraising partner of the Trust for Governors Island and the National Park Service, the Friends stewards the Island's green spaces, enhances the visitor experience, and builds a community dedicated to the Island's future.

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
